Course description

In this seminar we will study a range of theoretical puzzles about the law regulating discrimination in employment, service-provision, education, and other contexts. Our discussions will range across discrimination on grounds of sex, race, religion, age, sexuality, political viewpoint, and many other possible grounds. Examples will be taken from US constitutional law and from federal legislation, but also from the law of other jurisdictions, especially the UK, where antidiscrimination law has reached a relatively high level of doctrinal sophistication.

The seminar is **not** designed to equip you to be a discrimination law practitioner, or more generally to master the applicable black-letter law (which is vast and byzantine). Nor is it a seminar about policy design, implementation, or advocacy. Nor is it about the politics of discrimination. Nor is it an attempt to look at the problem of discrimination in a particular social context, or as part of a particular history. Nor is it about the special modes of reflection and critique (critical race theory, feminism, etc.) that such a history makes possible and desirable.

Rather, it is about abstract philosophical puzzles that lie in the background of the legal and policy debates, and that affect our conceptualization of the relevant social context and history. Our puzzles will include: What exactly is wrong with discrimination, when it is wrong? Does its wrongness depend on the consequences, and/or on historical contingencies? When discrimination is harmful, is the harm fundamentally a harm to opportunity or to identity or what? What makes a certain ground of discrimination an improper ground? Is it wrong to discriminate on such grounds in friendships, romantic relationships, etc. as well as in employment, schooling, etc.? Is indirect discrimination ('disparate impact') really a kind of discrimination? Is there any essential connection

between discrimination and equality? Why is discrimination a suitable matter for legal regulation, rather than something to be left to private ethics or the market?

As these sample questions suggest, we will not shy away from testing our most basic and cherished assumptions. Although there are no prerequisites, some knowledge of the Civil Rights Act 1964 (or similar legislation) would be an advantage. We will begin in the first seminar with an attempt at a broad overview of the relevant legal arrangements.

Approaching the seminar

There is probably too much reading listed below. For each class, it's better to read a couple of items carefully and critically than to try and be even-handed. You can have a quick skim of everything just to see where you would rather place your emphasis. Each week (after the first) two or three members of the class will present their own critical assessments of one item each. Those presenters will need to liaise to avoid choosing the same item. They will help to guide the shape of the class for the rest of us. However others in the class who have read different things will always be free to take the discussion off in different directions.

Each class member will submit an essay for grading, which is expected (but not required) to be a development of their class presentation. The length and the deadline are up for discussion, except that the former will be relatively short and the latter relatively generous.
